E-finance coming to the 445th

Reservists at the 445th Airlift Wing are now able to file travel vouchers electronically using the e-Finance Web site.

E-Finance is a user based system designated to streamline document processing at the Wright-Patterson Air Force Base finance office. It is designed to allow for the paperless submission of the travel voucher and other financial documents.

“The new system will make filing travel vouchers

a little easier for our Airmen,” said Matthew Thompson, 445th Airlift Wing financial manager.

Thompson says the process begins with the user establishing an account at e-Finance and then completing the traveling voucher there electronically. Supporting documents such as orders, receipts, etc. must be scanned or faxed. To complete the voucher,


await their safe return.

James Tyus, 88th Air Base Wing Airman and Family Readiness Center, family readiness non-commissioned officer in charge, said the purpose of the night was to reunite family, friends, co-workers and supervisors. He said that it’s important the member’s supervisor, commander and first sergeant be involved in the welcome home for the return of their Airmen.

“Airmen’s reintegration has a two-fold responsibility when it comes to returning to Wright-Patterson Air Force Base. While supervisors should be concerned about administrative and work-related transitions, they also should keep a pulse on the family while the member is deployed. Leadership’s role in welcoming back their deployed members is crucial to a successful reunion and reintegration in the home and the workplace,” Sergeant Tyus said.

Sergeant Fulker said the night was a memorable occasion that he’ll never forget.

documents are uploaded and then submitted to the reviewer.

Once a voucher is complete, it is digitally packaged and sent to the user’s finance office, processed locally and sent to the Air Force Financial Service Center at Ellsworth Air Force Base, S.D.

E-Finance can be used to file travel vouchers, however, inactive duty training travel vouchers must still be filed manually.

Direct link to the system requires a common access card. This will limit home use to only those who have this capability at home, Thompson added.

Reservists are encouraged to use e-Finance now as the program will be mandatory beginning Jan. 4, 2010.

For assistance with e-Finance, call (937) 257-3202 or visit the customer service office in Building 1, Monday - Friday. The customer service office has computers set up to assist and train in e-Finance.

Wing Airmen are living history

One of the wing's Airmen really knows how to dress to impress.

Phillip Textor, a health information services technician in the 445th Aeromedical Evacuation Squadron, travels to Eastern Ohio or West Virginia more than four times per year to participate in battle-field re-enactment campaigns. The re-enactments are not open to the public but allows those participating to relive history.

character throughout the entire event so it's very realistic," Sergeant Textor said.

He doesn't do it alone. He's part of the 91st Ohio Volunteer Infantry, a historical Civil War unit, and his girlfriend, Staff Sgt. Anne Marriott of the 445th Aerospace Medicine Squadron, joins him as frequently as she can.

"It started about 15 years ago. I was looking through a U.S. Cavalry catalog and saw a uniform – a jacket, pants and overcoat for \$20 – and I thought it looked neat so I sent away for it," Sergeant Textor said. "I didn't have any plans for it, but then I started doing research and thought it'd be neat to reproduce an historical uniform. It started from there."

The sergeant now has at least 15 different jackets and 20 pieces of headgear, including German uniforms from World War II, Civil War uniforms, and Cold War-era Soviet uniforms.

The Soviet uniforms are most difficult to accurately recreate, Sergeant Textor said.

When he's not involved in re-enactments, Sergeant Textor also attends various living history events, such as the Battle of Gettysburg, educating the public about military history and the various roles and uniforms of servicemembers in that time period.

"Living history events are a great way to educate the public what went on during the Civil War, for example. The public can see what kind of military uniforms were worn, where they set up camp, how meals were cooked, etc. The re-enactors stay in



"I'm trying to dress out the jacket as it would have appeared in 1985, but it's been difficult because not much information has been released since the Soviet Union fell," he said.

One uniform that is complete is Sergeant Textor's World War II-era uniform, which he wears every May when the Air Force Band of Flight does their annual Glenn Miller tribute. Sergeant Marriott, who became interested in re-enactment and living history more than seven years ago, joins him at the event in her complete Women's Army Air Corps uniform.

She also has Civil War period attire for Civil War living history events.

"It's fun. ...We like to portray a different time period," Sergeant Marriott explained. "I think I was born in the wrong era because I like doing the World War II period – the music and the dancing – and the Civil War is interesting. Some of the clothing is beautiful and it gives perspective on how people lived at different times. The Air Corps uniform just gives us a picture of our Air Force heritage. It's a way to know that the people who served before us have made an impact on the Air force we have today."

"It started with one uniform, then went to having some stuff," Sergeant Textor said, "then to having a room full of stuff. Then one day I realized I had a collection."

Sergeant Textor said getting involved in re-enacting has allowed him to see how our culture has changed over the years.

"It's fun and exciting to step into another period and to get a taste for what it was like for the servicemembers in World War I and World War II. (Stacy Vaughn contributed to this story)
