The 445th Airlift Wing Human Resources Development Council won the Maj. Gen. Joseph A. McNeil Award for HRDC Leadership Excellence Oct. 27 during the HRDC conference in Atlanta, Ga.

The Maj. Gen. Joseph A. McNeil Award, awarded biannually, is based on McNeil’s leadership during a civil rights movement in 1960. McNeil led four men known as the ‘Greensboro Four’ in a sit-in at a whites-only lunch counter at Woolworth’s.

The award is given to a wing that symbolizes leadership excellence, as well as hard work and determination. “It was well-deserved,” said Col. Steven D. Johnson, Vice Commander of the 445th Airlift Wing. “I wasn’t surprised that

we won. The troops put in a lot of hard work.” The HRDC conference is hosted by the Air Force Reserve Command HRDC and is used to make recommendations to the Chief of Air Force Reserve on all matters pertaining to human resources within the command.

445 AW participates in base-wide FOD walk

Forty people from the 445th Airlift Wing joined more than 150 men and women from the base for a base-wide FOD (foreign object debris) walk across the main 12,000 foot by 300 foot runway Nov. 10 in an effort to find any debris that could potentially cause damage to aircraft flying into and out of Wright-Patterson Air Force Base.

While preventing damage to aircraft, especially in this economic environment, is important, potentially saving lives is paramount. FOD inspections are common in an aircraft operational environment. The FOD walk that took place was anything but routine.

“I’ve been here for 29 years and we’ve never done a close inspection FOD walk on the runway in that time,” Mr. Gary Sebring, 88th Operation Support Squadron, Base Operations, said.

Mr. Louis Dann, 88th Air Base Wing FOD manager since 2004, concurred that he’s never conducted a FOD walk on the main runway either and was amazed at the turnout.

“We had a huge day. The weather was phenomenal and the turnout was terrific,” Mr. Dann said.

The participants were broken into two groups. Working at opposite ends and moving towards the center of the runway, FOD walkers picked up everything from loose concrete, rubber sealer, and miscellaneous

“stuff”. When the last participant emptied their trash bag of FOD, it was determined that more 440 pounds of FOD was found that afternoon.

Col. Stephen Goeman, 445th Airlift Wing commander, was pleased with the partnership and the reputation the wing is building as a Team Wright-Patt player.

“We had folks from many different work centers who participated in the FOD walk,” Colonel Goeman said.

Backing that sentiment, Mr. Dann said, “We get great support and coordination from the reserve side of the field and that goes a long way in promoting a safe environment for all of us.”

For Senior Airman Dennis Kimble, 445th Logistics Readiness Squadron, the opportunity allowed him to see a different side of his work environment than he’s used to. “I see the runway from my office every day. Now I can say I’ve walked out there,” Airman Kimble said.

“Safety doesn’t take a holiday and it knows no privilege, it really impacts everybody,” said Lt. Col. Bill Barton, 445 AW safety officer.

“While this may be a first, we certainly hope it’s not the last partnered FOD walk,” he added.

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M-16 that they had to carry with them at all times. On the day of the exercise, CES reservists were transported to the deployed location in a convoy. During the convoy the group traveled through simulated villages where the cadre was waiting to ambush the convoy and fire on the group, making the scenario very realistic.

“Throughout the day we were given various scenarios and reacted as if it were a real situation. There were attacks where we lost members and services’ mortuary affairs had to “process” the remains,” Sergeant Wescott said.

Everyone was required to perform tasks they would be required to do in a real deployed situation, to include; erecting large tents for various uses, repairing the runway from an explosion so aircraft could land, purifying the water supply, setting up the mobile aircraft arresting system, and hooking up power to the deployed location.

Chief Master Sgt. Ronald Rearick, 445th CES chief of operations, participated in Silver

Flag and reflected on one of the many tasks his Airmen performed, which included filling a crater created on the runway by an explosion during one of the training scenarios.

“We were prepared for this scenario. We placed materials in the crater and then compacted the materials until level with the old pavement. The repair was

then covered with a fiberglass FOD cover that is anchored to the concrete,” Chief Rearick said.

Sergeant Wescott reiterated the importance of and the lessons learned during Silver Flag.

“This was a very realistic exercise and a real learning experience. For one thing, services needed to erect the tent and we needed to supply them with power and air conditioning so they could then begin cooking our lunch. We didn’t eat until this was done,” Sergeant Wescott said.

All in all, the training was a success and allowed the reservists to gain a first-hand experience

of working in a deployed location.

“The training was fantastic. It was a great experience,” Chief Rearick said.

Sergeant Wescott went on to say, “The camaraderie built during this training was absolutely awesome! We were able to watch our young Airmen learn and grow. Members had opportunities to step up and lead.”

Honor Guard members selected for AFRC awards

Master Sgt. Mark C. Lyle, superintendent of the Wright-Patterson Air Force Base honor guard, has been selected as the 2010 Air Force Reserve Command Program Manager of the year (his fifth consecutive year) and Tech. Sgt. Shawn McKellop, 445th Logistics Readiness Squadron and member of the honor guard, has been selected as the 2010 Air Force Reserve Command Honor Guard member of the year.



Sergeant Lyle's accomplishments include the oversight of more than 125 active duty Airmen assigned to the Wright-Patterson Air Force Base Honor Guard. His honor guard teams traveled 540,000 miles; performed 2,237 funerals and 271 color guard events. Sergeant Lyle managed \$1.25M in assets-\$120K fleet of seven vehicles. He also initiated more than 78 Achievement Medals, recognizing the deserving service of the honor guard members.

Tech. Sgt. McKellop's accomplishments include the performance of liaison duties for 14 Air National Guard and Air Force Reserve Command units. He provided expert oversight for acquisition of Military Personnel Appropriation days, ensuring 100% payment disbursement to honor guard members. Sergeant McKellop personally performed 135 honor guard details and on 16 separate occasions, he performed multiple details in one day.
