445th Airlift Wing, looking back at 2016

445th Airlift Wing Public Affairs

The 445th Airlift Wing wrapped up another successful year of mission accomplishments Dec. 31, 2016.

The year 2016 began with a maintenance group change of command and operations group assumption of command in January. The wing welcomed Col. Cade Gibson and Col. Craig McPike respectively.

The spring of 2016 was a buzz as the wing honored Airmen and families at its annual awards banquet April 2 at the National Museum of the U.S. Air Force. The next month, the 445th welcomed its new wing commander, Col. Adam Willis on May 15.

Forty-three 445 AW members participated in a multi-agency training exercise at Toledo Express Airport, Toledo, Ohio, May 12-15, 2016. The Toledo trainer's third year consisted of 37 organizations from 13 states. There were approximately 300 participants from various branches of the military.

Continuing with its robust schedule, the 445th participated in a Unit Effectiveness Inspection in June. The wing earned an "Effective" rating during the UEI and nine Airmen and two teams earned special recognition as superior performers, while three Airmen received the military bearing award.

The 445th participated in humanitarian and community outreach efforts. The wing delivered 615,000 meals to Haiti as part of Denton Program in May. The

445th Civil Engineer Squadron helped construct a 20,000 square feet multi-use facility for a Boy Scouts of America's camp in Raymond, Maine and completed renovations on the community's 150-year-old fairgrounds in Chenango County, New York.

In August, the wing hosted a Wright-Patterson Air Force Base Total Force combat dining in. Col. Adam Willis, 445 AW commander rocked out with the band KISS at the Wright State University Nutter Center Aug. 22 and thanked them for their support of the troops.

During the fall, the wing hosted 90 students from six Dayton area high schools for the Women's of Women Conference designed to heighten awareness of young ladies who are interested in aviation.

The November UTA was filled with excitement as Reservists showcased their various missions to 70 civilian employers.

The 445th wrapped up the year with 4,921 flying hours which included 1,205 sorties and 181 missions. Wing C-17 Globemaster IIIs transported more than 10,000 patients and 15,662 tons of cargo.

Fifty-five 445th Airmen supported Department of Defense efforts by deploying to various countries in Southwest Asia, Iraq, Afghanistan, Germany, Spain and Gabon, Africa.

Airman Wade created and modified more than 200 orders involving 91 troop movements. She implemented a squadron newcomers briefing, delivering timely critical information to 34 new Airmen coming into the unit. Wade maintained 149 readiness folders that had 60 deficiencies that she helped rectify on the spot. The Airman managed multiple deployments training involving 103 members serving at more than 13 locations. During her off-duty time, Wade is actively involved with the Air Force Sergeants Association. She volunteered at the Dayton Vectren Air Show and judged a local high science school fair. Wade is currently enrolled at Park University where she's pursuing a Bachelor of Science degree in psychology.

Staff Sgt. Joshua Sagan, 445th Aeromedical Evacuation Squadron aeromedical evacuation technician, is the 445th Airlift Wing NCO of the Quarter, fourth quarter. Sergeant Sagan supported a deployment short-fall, helping care for 249 wounded warriors. He oversaw 10 Expeditionary Aeromedical Evacuation Flight litter station augmentation set custodial duties, processing eight work orders and tracked \$3,000 in repairs. Sagan overhauled the in-flight kit supply room by teaming up with the logistics flight, creating a streamlined storage system to secure \$235,000 in Air Force assets. During his off-duty time, Sagan volunteered with the American Red Cross, assembling more than 700 care packages for displaced Syrian refugees. He rode in a charity cycling race, helping to raise more \$25,000. Sagan is working on his Community College of the Air Force degree and a Bachelor of Science degree in nursing.

He's the principal instructor for all aspects of medical and AE training, providing triage skills to more than 1,200 Airmen. During his offduty time, Mauter was the course director and lead instructor for the Boy Scouts of America wilderness first aid and CPR program in the Boy Scouts High Adventure program. He's a volunteer paramedic for Miami Township, Ohio, contributing more than 220 hours of service in the last three months. Mauter received technical studies, emergency medical services degree from the University of Cincinnati.

Capt. Sarah Ripma, Maintenance 445th Squadron, is the 445th Airlift Wing CGO of the Quarter, fourth quarter. Captain Ripma postured crash damage or disabled aircraft recovery team for training compliance by identifying and ordering \$7,000 of critical supplies. She implemented aerospace ground equipment corrosion program by achieving 90 re-coats that saved the air Force two years and \$250,000 on replacements. Ripma's leadership was a key element in the squadron being selected as recipients of the Chief of Staff Team Excellence Award. She was a key player in successful FY 16 mission capable rate 82.4 percent. Ripma worked with host base resiliency program to implement program for the aerospace medicine and maintenance squadrons.


