FM tip of the month - lodging non-availability

Travelers are mandated to use the Defense Travel System or the Central Ticketing Office (CTO/SATO) to schedule all of their lodging needs.

When lodging is not available on a military installation, DTS will automatically issue and record a certificate of non-availability (CNA). The exception to this rule is group pre-arranged lodging. Members must provide name of hotel and reservation number in the DTS authorization pre-audit screen for group pre-arranged lodging.

Non-availability forms must include a confirmation number, which should be dated before the first duty day but must be secured prior to the end of the duty period and included in the travel voucher. Failure to comply may result in an audit, reimbursement at the Department of Defense standard lodging rate and debt collection for the difference.

Per the Joint Travel Regulations 020303.F: Required Documentation When Government Quarters Are not Available, when government quarters are not available, a DoD service member is required to obtain a non-availability confirmation number provided by the service's lodging registration process to justify reim-

bursement for commercial lodging and per diem. When government quarters are not available at an Integrated Lodging Program Pilot (ILPP) site, a civilian employee is required to obtain a non-availability confirmation number provided by the service's lodging registration process to justify reimbursement for commercial lodg-

ing and per diem.

As of June 1, 2018, the JTR no longer allows a traveler to self-certify the non-availability of government quarters. Units are not allowed to blanket issue CNAs. Only the Service's lodging office or the Defense Travel System can issue these documents.

If the traveler does not include an actual non-availability confirmation number from billeting, the 445th Financial Management Office must compute the voucher as if lodging was available.

For prompt and accurate payment, DTS or eFinance vouchers must include the lodging receipt, showing the amount paid in full and charged to their Government Travel Card, and the CNA.

Mental health assessment key to readiness

Each year, Airmen are required to complete a PHA (physician's health assessment) to maintain readiness.

Depending on the career field, service members are either required an in-person PHA with a doctor or to complete a PHAQ online questionnaire that will be reviewed by medical personnel. The questionnaire seeks to determine the presence of external factors, lifestyle choices, or stressors that could lead to potential health problems.

Once the PHA is completed, Airmen are required to set up a mental health assessment. The MHA is performed by LHI, a third-party contractor. Airmen must ensure that an account is set-up with LHI by visiting https://lhi.care/start. The website provides step-by-step instructions to create a user profile.

Once the account is created, members will have

the opportunity to schedule a phone call appointment with a representative. It is recommended that cell phone number is provided instead of a landline to a ensure availability during the appointment time. If the LHI agent calls and does not connect, he or she will not call again. It is up to the member to reschedule the appointment.

Once the MHA is performed, the results will be sent to a provider who will review and determine if further action should be taken.

Failure to maintain medical readiness status could result in "no pay-no points" until the status is cleared to green.

CY 19 STEP II requirements announced

The Air Force Reserve Command Stripes for Exceptional Performers II board is just around the corner. The program is highly competitive and seeks to promote Airmen E-6 through E-9 one grade above the authorized grade for their position. Packages are due to career development May 2, 2019.

The Stripes for Exceptional Performers (STEP II) board will convene at AFRC July 23-27, 2019.

Nominees should have satisfactory participation for the previous 12 month period (individuals with any unexcused absences within the previous 12 month period are not eligible). Nominees must meet all eligibility requirements (except time in grade and time in service) at the time of nomination and on the Promotion Eligibility Cutoff Date (PECD Sept. 30, 2019)

TIG & TIS requirements must be met by Sept. 30, 2019.

Fitness must be current at time of nomination and on the PECD (Sept. 30, 2019)

The following is a change to Air Force Form 1206:

-AF Form 1206 will be 18 lines in bullet format to include mandatory headings. No signature is required on the AF Form 1206.

LRS Airman recognized during recent deployment



Sgt. Jeffrey Master Terry, 445th Logistics Readiness Squadron fuels operation manager, returned from a recent deployment to two different bases in Southwest Asia where he earned special recognition and received seven command coins from both wing commanders and squadron commanders in recognition for working diligently and performing duties outside his Air Force Specialty Code [career field].

Terry was assigned as the facility manager for 386th Expeditionary Logistics Readiness Squadron for petroleum lubricants. During his deployment with this unit, Terry dealt with daily sand storms that would close all roads into the base and routes to and from aircraft required for mission capability. During one particular sandstorm, no civil engineer personnel were readily available to maintain roads so Terry acquired a loader to move sand on truck routes and at fuel facilities to keep the mission moving with no delays. He later teamed up with civil engineers to remove 27 million tons of sand.

Terry oversaw the cleanup of a ruptured 6 inch fuel line that had spilled more than 5,000 gallons of fuel within a few minutes. The line was repaired and back into operation within 25 minutes.

The sergeant submitted an idea to the Idea to Innovation program to help improve vehicle maintenance. He submitted an idea for part identification and request and his submission is still under review.

While assigned to the 386th, Terry was hand-selected and sent TDY to support the 387th AW. While there, he was

tasked to support Project Cargo City, a \$24 million project behind schedule. His skill set for equipment operation saved the military more than \$300,000 and brought Cargo City back on schedule within 27 days from a six-month delay by working 16-hour shifts, seven days a week.

his During tenure there, he completed the following: milled 10 thousand tons of asphalt (252 man hours); construction of a satellite communications pad – construction of HRT (Human Remain Transient); security lane construction; communications tower pad construction - foreign object damage checkpoint; and construction of service station preparation site.

TAP required for deploying Airmen

The Transition Assistance Program is congressionally mandated under the Veterans Opportunity to Work Act of 2011 and governed by U.S. Code: Title 10; Department of Defense Instruction 1332.35; Air Force Instruction 36-3009, Airmen and Family Readiness Centers; and the Air Force TAP Operational Guide.

The VOW Act requires that Citizen Airmen who are activated on Title 10 orders for more than 180 days (except school or training) complete TAP, no later than 90 days prior to the expiration date on their Title 10 orders.

Citizen Airmen are required to complete different portions of TAP, depending on their employment and/or higher education/career technical training status.

Reservists will fall under Track I or Track 2 for TAP. To determine which TAP program is right for you, visit the A&FR Share-Point page at https://afrc.eim.us.af.mil/sites/

445aw/445MSG/445FSS Sharepoint/AFR/default. aspx and select the appropriate TAP Track.

445th SFS wins 2018 AFRC security forces award

The 445th Security Forces Squadron won the 2018 Air Force Reserve Command Annual Outstanding Unit Award, Outstanding Security Forces Tenant Unit of the Year Award category. The announcement was made Feb. 19, 2019.

Dedicated to combat readiness, the 445th SFS scheduled and trained more than 2,000 war fighters on six unique weapons systems the wing supported.

The 445th SFS procured \$250,000 funding for facility and mobility upgrade, enabling reutilization under dire fiscal. constraints, saving the wing \$80,000. They structured the attainment of squadron innovative funds by implementing a new shoot, move and communicate tactics program resulting in \$82,000 being awarded for advanced security forces readiness.

humanitarian operations involving eight
members in a time

frame of 85 days, supporting six missions in four austere locations. Four security forces trainers instructed a readiness course for 2,000 warfighters, fulfilling a

new 445th Airlift Wing training requirement in one quarter.

The squadron held the Winter Warrior Challenge that involved 16 teams, 90 defenders and included five task-based events. The event boosted the cohesion and mental toughness of its Airmen. SFS Airmen were part of a multi-organization "Defenders Day Challenge" that integrated the training of 40 445th Aeromedical

Staging Squadron and 445th Aeromedical Evacuation Squadron personnel. The training event improved the wing's combat readiness.

The 445th **SFS** developed their annual 445 SFS 9/11 Ruck March to honor fallen heroes and established a security forces memorial. SFS participated Airmen in the wing's Wings of Women event by providing the group with a SFS weapons and armor display, provided a vehicle the group could see up-close and gave a tactics demo to the attendees. SFS Airmen provided handson demonstrations to more than 500 Civil
