

445th AW Airmen sharpen survival skills in Key West

Members of the 445th Airlift Wing participated in a mass water survival and rescue training exercise Nov. 21-22, 2024, in Key West, Florida.

Sixty-five members with the 89th Airlift Squadron, 445th Operations Support Squadron and 445th Aeromedical Evacuation Squadron participated in the coalition exercise that included involvement the U.S. Navy, U.S. Coast Guard and Key West Police Department. The 445th Sur-



ment contributed additional support and safety measures during the operations.

Officer Tyler Getchel, Key West Police Department Marine Unit, agreed that joint exercises like this are beneficial to every organization involved.

"We try to help out as much as we can," Getchel said. "Anything that we can do to keep a good partnership with the groups that come down here is what we try to do. We understand the importance of training

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vival Evasion Resistance and Escape team conducted the training that focused on maintaining life on a raft and recovery procedures in the event of a downed aircraft in open water. This allowed the 445th to experience the entire water evacuation process.

According to Master Sgt. Dustin Dobbs, 445th OSS SERE superintendent, the water survival training ensured aircrew and passengers are ready and resilient in adverse situations where open water rescue may be required.

"There are many factors to consider when planning a joint exercise like this," Dobbs said. "The mission objectives, capabilities of all the participating units, available resources and training areas take about six months to a year in advance to coordinate, but cooperating with our partners is a significant aspect of training.

"Although the planning process is complex, building relationships and relying on our joint partners is crucial to mission success," Dobbs continued.

The Navy's involvement included their helicopter Search and Rescue unit; the Coast Guard provided coastal protection; and the Key West Police Departand are glad to help."

Simultaneous to entering the water, students inflated their life preservers, and once in the water, created a human chain to help everyone get to the raft safely. In the raft, the crew established a chain of command to delegate tasks such as bailing water out of the raft. Students also maintained accountability, solved problems and assessed injuries.

"One of the things that we were testing was our onscene commander's ability to take control of the situation," Dobbs said. "It was crucial for them to be able to signal the C-17, get communications with it, so then the C-17 could communicate to Navy rescue helicopters to come retrieve the students. It was a huge win for us to be able to make sure that we were good on it. We don't get the opportunity very often to exercise that and to be able to go through that checklist."

Once the raft was located by the Navy's helicopter unit, Airmen prepared to be hoisted one at a time out of the raft by strap or basket with assistance from an expert Navy rescue swimmer. Cautiously, each student

Throughout the year, the wing participated in various exercises to maintain and improve readiness that included Exercises African Lion, Pacific Dagger, Northern Strike, Patriot Medic and Vigilant Elk. Nearly a dozen members deployed to various locations including Germany, Qatar, Spain and Saudi Arabia.

The 445th Airlift Wing provided personnel to support Operations Inherent Resolve, Spartan Shield and Juniper Shield. Additionally, units completed Big Safari and Integrated Munitions Flight missions.

The wing welcomed its new commander, Col. Douglas A. Perry Jr. in June. Leadership from 4th Air Force, Maj. Gen. D. Scott Durham and Chief Master Sgt. Travon Dennis, visited the wing in January and June to

The entire wing took a moment to pause in September during the wing's annual family day event. This day was set aside for Airmen and their families to spend time with individual squadrons and have an opportunity to connect with others in the wing.

In November, the wing, with support from the Ohio Employer Support of the Guard and Reserve, honored 40 of its employers from Ohio, Michigan, Indiana, Kentucky, California and Tennessee during an Employer Appreciation Day.

The wing ended the year with a successful flying hour program. The 445th Operations Group with support from the 445th Maintenance Group flew 719 sorties for a total of 122 missions across the globe to areas including Brazil, Japan, Germany and Spain. Approximately 6.4 million pounds of cargo was transported and 3,111 passengers airlifted in calendar year 2024.



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was raised to the hovering helicopter. Airmen were pulled aboard the helicopter once they were in arms reach where they were suspended approximately 80 feet in the air.

Staff Sgt. David Wilson, 445th OSS intelligence specialist, believed the water survival training was beneficial and prepared him for real-life rescue scenarios. He described his rescue experience in the basket hoist.

"When it was my turn to be hoisted, it was loud and there was water splashing in my face," Wilson said. "I wasn't scared, but it was intense for a few seconds while I



Right place, right time

Being in the right place at the right time and talking to the right people can change an Airman's path when least expected.

That seemed to be the case for Airman 1st Class David Lopez, 87th Aerial Port Squadron cargo apprentice, when he applied to attend the 2024 annual Student Veterans of American Leadership Institute conference.

Lopez, a student at Shawnee State University and president of the school's SVA chapter, was one of 80 out of over 200,000 applicants who attended the conference in Washington, D.C.

The SVA is an organization that promotes academic, professional and personal development of veterans in higher education through chapter programs and services. Lopez said there are around 750,000 members in SVA all over the U.S. and two other countries.

"I hesitated when applying," Lopez said. "I didn't know if I'd be able to get through the selection process. When I got the acceptance email two days later, I was in shock that I got it."

In late October 2024, Lopez was flown to Washington, D.C. where he spent the next four days attending the course and exploring the nation's capital.

"It was phenomenal to say the least," Lopez said. "They showed us things that we didn't even think of and things we didn't even know were possible. The whole course was about learning how to become a good leader, how to lead, being a part of a group and being an effective contributor in a group."

In lieu of presenting questions to Congress, attendees were given the chance to present their questions to higher up members of the Department of Defense, members of the Biden administration and some indi-

viduals from the Department of Education.

However, due to some issues, Lopez and other students were unable to participate in this portion of the conference and passed along their questions to other students.

Lopez was presented with the opportunity to showcase the flexibility of Airmen and decided to coordinate a tour of the National Gallery of Art by reaching out to a fellow Airman he knew in the area who is a Capitol Police officer.

The officer was not on duty at the time, so he introduced them to another officer who took them around the area, hooked them up with challenge coins and some other swag.

Lopez said the highlight of the tour was a stop at the Library of Congress where the officer took them in an elevator which took them into the dome of the building.

"It was a phenomenal view," Lopez said. "You could see the entire D.C. area. You could see the Pentagon, the Capitol, the Washington Monument, the White House, Cathedrals, everything. It was amazing to say the least."

Lopez said the combination of the stellar training and the amazing tour really made up for him not being able to present his questions in person. He missed out on doing some of the exciting things planned but still stumbled into a great overall experience.

"My roommate and I did kind of a self-study of, What are the chances?" Lopez said. "What are the chances of getting into the Leadership Institute? You had to serve in the military just to get in. Then, you had to apply and be one of the 80 selected. After being picked, what are the odds you end up at the Library of Congress enjoying a breathtaking view? It was just too cool."
